FAB speaker: Dr Manish Gupte, India
The ethics of sharing and caring: towards an agenda for gender justice

The application of ethical principles in our daily work, whether in research or in interventions at the individual and community level gets complicated as structures of inequality inside and outside the home get consolidated at the global level, and also as hitherto unrecognised identities and forms of resistance emerge. This historical moment offers an opportunity for self-reflection; to ask whether and how ethical practice can be liberated from the confines of a clinical or research setting to addressing unethical structures that create and strengthen imbalance in power among people. Could this shift, from the 'ethics of doing' to the 'ethics of being' at the personal and professional levels, while simultaneously addressing all forms of inequities at the broader level, help prepare a road map for gender justice and social transformation based on equality and human rights?
